

The Passage Of a Bill


Members vote on whether the Bill should pass in the first House. If yes, the Bill continues. If no, the process ends here.

Members debate the merits of the Bill.

Members vote to continue the passage of the Bill. If yes, the Bill continues. If no, the process ends here.

Members work through each part of the Bill and ask questions about it or make changes.

For a Bill to become a law, both Houses must agree to every part of it word-for-word.



Members vote to continue the passage of the Bill. If yes, the Bill continues. If no, the Bill process ends here.

Members work through each part of the Bill and ask questions about it or make changes.

A message is sent to the other House asking them to consider the Bill. The process is repeated in the second House to properly scrutinise the Bill.

The Clerk reads out the title of the Bill.

Members vote on whether the Bill should pass in the second House. If yes, the Bill continues. If no, the process ends here.
